Fairs provide opportunities for 4-H youth to exhibit their project accomplishments, demonstrate mastery, receive important recognition for their efforts, develop leadership and teamwork skills. Shows and exhibitions provide venues for youth to engage with expert judges, other people with similar interests, and the public.
