Sharing knowledge along the way, these younger members are encouraged to help with my animals' feeding, fitting,

and exercising. In doing so, I exhibit leadership, something that now goes hand in hand with showing livestock. These leadership experiences have been impactful and build character as I focus on giving experiences to others instead of focusing on myself. Ultimately, the hope is to give younger members the same opportunities I had.

In the words of John Maxwell, “Champions don’t become champions in the ring - they are merely recognized there.” This quote speaks volumes because champions are made by working to become the best one can be. This is what it took to be champion Ayrshire showman at the 2018 Maryland State Fair. Despite being the first year showing dairy cattle, I managed to come out on top. While this came with a great deal of pride, there were also numerous life skills that developed along the way. Just a few include determination and self-motivation to go to the barn even on the bad days and put forth the best effort with my heifer. Preparation did not just include working her, but also fitting and studying to be prepared when we entered the ring. Winning seemed impossible as more experienced showmen entered the ring, but I never stopped trying and came out on top. Afterwards, there was humility and character in congratulating the other winners and thanking all who had a part in the success. The experience in the ring is unforgettable, but the best parts of showing dairy cattle have been making friends, spending time on the farm, and learning everything possible about the dairy industry.

When I look through the best memories and greatest experiences, most of them involve 4-H and are experiences that I otherwise never would have had. Livestock has been a focal point throughout the years. These projects have taught practical skills of hard work, commitment, and a desire to always be better. But more importantly, they have created a true leader that intends to give other 4-Hers the opportunities to be successful and continue making the best better.
