

C Burr Artz AgSploration Series





What are the steps to becoming a 4-H volunteer?

Enroll in 4-HOnline as a Volunteer to start the process.

- Go to https://v2.4honline.com/
- •If you already have a family profile, while in your "Member List" click on "Add Member" and then complete *New Applicant* as your Volunteer position.
- •If you are brand new to 4-H, please create a new account and then select *New Applicant* as your Volunteer position.

After you complete your enrollment in 4-HOnline, you will receive an email from Kim Krasauskis with the following steps for completing your 4-H Volunteer On Boarding:

- ♦ 1. Background Check: Once you complete your 4-HOnline enrollment (#2 above), the Maryland 4-H office will send you an invitation email around the 1st or 15th of the month (depending on when you submitted your enrollment) through vendor Sterling Volunteers. THIS MUST BE COMPLETED WITHIN 30 DAYS OF RECEIVING THE INITIAL EMAIL FROM TheAdvocates@sterlingvolunteer.com or you will be DISMISSED by Maryland 4-H for one year and unable to volunteer with 4-H until completing the onboarding in 2024.
- **2. References:** An *Adobe Sign* email will be sent to your 3 references listed in your 4-HOnline Screening, so they can complete the reference form digitally. Please let them know in advance so they can watch for the email coming from kkrasaus@umd.edu.
- ♦ **3. Volunteer Orientation Training -Please watch** this 4-H Volunteer Orientation Video and then complete the Orientation Survey. Our office will automatically receive a notification of your completion of the 4-H Volunteer Orientation Training Survey.
- ♦ **4. Phone Interview** To select a sign up time please go to: https://bit.ly/4-HVolunteerInterview
- **5.** Signing an **Appointment Agreement and Position Description** via an Adobe Sign email that will be sent to you after Steps 1-4 are completed.

** A 4-H Volunteer cannot work with 4-H Youth until ALL the above steps are completed and the 4-HOnline record is approved by both the State office and our local Frederick County office. The volunteer will receive a welcome email after all steps and approvals are completed and they are cleared to work with 4-H youth.

Lincoln

The Lincoln Elementary After-school 4-H Club applied and received a \$500.00 grant from the Maryland Sierra Club to replace invasive landscape shrubs with native plants at Lincoln Elementary School. This native landscaping provides habitat for insects and birds, as well as opportunities for children at Lincoln Elementary School to study and learn up close about wildlife. These plantings also help the school work towards becoming a Green School with the MAEOE (Maryland Association for Environmental and Outdoor Education). The entire process included coordination with the Lincoln School Administration, the Frederick County Board of Education Facilities Division, Frederick County Master Gardeners, The United Way, the Lincoln Elementary After-school 4-H Club leader Amy Rembold and local nurseries. For Earth Day, the Lincoln School Elementary After-school 4-H Club planted two Red Chokeberries. The students loved being able to plant shrubs and know that this plant will provide food for insects and wildlife. The following week the 4-H Club members watched as two sparrows were using the shrub as a perch. The students learned about invasive plants and that they do not provide food and habitat for local wildlife. They learned that by replacing the invasive with native shrubs, not only local wildlife would benefit but this action would prevent further spread of these invasive plants. During one of their 4-H Club meetings, the After-school 4-H Club spent the entire hour weeding and planting one of the beds in front of the school with the native shrubs. The members loved planting shrubs and some native flowers. The members learned that these plants would provide food and habitat for the local wildlife around the school. The Lincoln Elementary After-school 4-H Club has members aged 5-8 and meets weekly during the school year to engage in hands-on learning experiences involving outdoor education. They are able to learn about the environment around them and how to preserve it.




Rabbit Raisers

Nine Agency Rule Notification

The USDA Office of Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights (OASCR) recently sent out priority guidance regarding the revised 7 CFR Part 16 "Nine Agency Rule" on July 2, 2024. The revisions have clarified various provisions regarding notification requirements under the rule, which reestablishes important religious liberty protections for beneficiaries of federally funded social services (all extension programs).

AGNR operating units in whole or in part alert beneficiaries such programs and services are delivered on a nondiscriminatory basis through the utilization of public notification requirements and the University of Maryland's Policy on Nondiscrimination and Procedures VI-100 (B).
